OVERVIEW: In this course, we will study the work of women artists from early times to the modern era. Other topics considered will include images of women, women's patronage of the arts, and conditions affecting women's artistic production and creativity.

READING: Required reading for this course:

Nancy Heller, <u>Women Artists: an Illustrated History</u>, 4th ed. (New York: Abbeville Press, 2003).

Coursepack of four articles

The coursepack, which you will need first, is available at Follett's Bookstore in the Student Union. The textbook will be available at all bookstores, or you may order it online. You will need the coursepack right away, and the textbook for the third week of class.

REQUIREMENTS: There will be two examinations in the class, a midterm on March 6, and a final on April 24. Examinations will include image work and essay questions. A term paper will also be assigned, due at the beginning of class on April 12. We will discuss the term paper project in class, and a handout will be available for guidance. In addition, we will be holding a number of directed discussions during class; come prepared to take part. Grades for this course will be determined by the following formula:

Midterm exam 25% Final exam 25% Paper 40% Class participation 10%

Please note that there will be no makeup examinations in this class, and no extensions can be given on the paper. Please plan your time carefully. As in all college courses, timely completion of reading assignments and faithful class attendance are a must. Please note the final exam date, which is Provost-mandated and cannot be changed.
